



I-693 Immigration Medical Exam Checklist

1. Government-Issued Photo ID

- Valid passport (strongly recommended)
- OR other government-issued ID with name, date of birth, and photo (e.g., driver's license, national ID)

2. Vaccination Records

- Bring official records of all previous vaccinations
- If you don't have proof, the civil surgeon may recommend blood tests or administer required vaccines

3. Form I-693 (Do Not Sign Yet)

- Bring a **blank Form I-693**, printed and unfilled (We provided to you and fill it electronically)
- The civil surgeon will guide you on completing and signing it during the appointment

4. Medical Insurance Card (If Applicable)

- Some clinics accept insurance, but many require self-pay
- Always verify payment policies before your visit

5. List of Current Medications

- Include dosage, frequency, and purpose
- Helps the doctor assess your overall health and medication history

6. Records of Chronic or Serious Medical Conditions

- Include diagnosis, treatment history, and physician letters if applicable
- Especially important for conditions like tuberculosis, HIV, or mental health disorders

7. Lab Test Results (If Previously Completed)

- TB test results (e.g., IGRA or skin test)
- Chest X-ray (if previously positive for TB)

8. Interpreter (If Needed)

- Some clinics require you to bring your own interpreter if you're not fluent in English (We provide services in Spanish, Haitian Creole and French)
- Make arrangements in advance
